Course Description

Benvenuti! This course offers an introduction to standard spoken and written Italian for those who have no previous knowledge of the language. The course will seek to develop your communicative competence in all four language areas in a usable and practical way: speaking, aural comprehension, reading and writing. You will also become familiar with aspects of the culture and history of the Italian peninsula through short dialogues and literary passages, music, multimedia, etc. that offer a realistic portrayal of contemporary Italian life.

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- A. Understand simple texts written in Italian
 - Recognize basic vocabulary in Italian
 - Understand basic sentence structure in Italian
- B. Engage in conversation in Italian
 - Correctly pronounce basic words in Italian
 - Know basic verbs and their conjugations in Italian
- C. Write short texts in Italian
 - Spell basic words in Italian
 - Conjugate basic verbs in context.
- D. Know some aspects of the history and culture of Italy
 - Know the outline of Italy's history
 - Know some aspects of the various regions of Italy
