COURSE DESCRIPTION

Benvenuti a tutti! This course is a continuation of ITAL 101 (Introduction to Italian Language 1) and aims to build and reinforce your communicative competence in all four areas of linguistic proficiency: aural comprehension, reading, speaking and writing. In addition to expanding your Italian vocabulary and becoming familiar with more of the important grammatical concepts of the Italian language, you will also learn about aspects of the culture and history of the Italian peninsula through exposure to audio-visual materials that offer a realistic portrayal of contemporary Italian life.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of Ital 102, students should attain a level of competency that allows them to:

- 1 a) Use essentials of Italian grammar in speaking and writing in order to be able to request, provide and obtain information on a range of practical topics.
 - b) Describe surroundings, places, people and their feelings.
 - c) Talk about events that happened in the past.
 - d) Discuss present, past, and future activities using a wide range of vocabulary.
- 2. Read, with increased comprehension, general-interest articles in newspapers and magazines,

as well as simple stories, brochures, signs, advertisements, lyrics of songs and poems.

- 3. Understand clearly articulated Italian speech within the limits of familiar vocabulary.
- 4. Become knowledgeable of Italian history, culture, society, geography within the scope of this course.

Quizzes

Three quizzes will be administered over the course of the term and are based on topics from course material covered up to that point. Each deals with aspects of grammar and/or

vocabulary as well as a bonus question about culture/geography/history. The quizzes last 30 minutes each.

Midterm test

The midterm test will cover a substantial number of topics (with relevant grammar and vocabulary) discussed in class. The test will last 80 minutes. A Mock midterm will guide students as to what topics to focus on.

Group ORAL PRESENTATION

This is a group project that you will complete on a topic to be decided upon in consultation with your instructor. You will be given more information about what is required, the marking rubric, etc. at a later date.

Class participation/attendance

You will be involved in a series of interactive activities to acquaint yourself with new language structures and review homework. Consistent attendance and participation are essential and will affect your performance and evaluation.

Weekly Tophat activities

EVERY WEEK (starting from the beginning of the second week) online activities are assigned based on the Tophat exercises. You are responsible for completing weekly homework assignments via Tophat.

NOTA BENE: Instructors will be verifying completion of Tophat activities weekly, so be sure to keep up!

Language Lab and Oral Test (5+5%)

The lab consists of a <u>scheduled weekly one-hour session</u> that provides you with the opportunity to consolidate in a more conversational format the topics covered in class that week. Attendance is mandatory and will be taken at every meeting. Please note that labs

start the second week of classes (week starting 13th January). Attendance and Participation in labs is equivalent to 5%.

The oral test is also equivalent to 5%. It will last 5 minutes and will take place during the last two weeks of tutorials. The oral tests will be conducted by lab tutor Elisabetta Marinelli. The student will select the topic she/he would like to talk about and will prepare the vocabulary. A list of topics (same as those covered throughout the course) will be circulated at the beginning of the tutorials and students will select the theme on which they want to focus and the time slot when they wish to be assessed. During the oral test, the instructor will be asking questions/ showing prompts and the student is expected to answer questions and carry out a short conversation mostly in Italian. A rubric explaining the assessment of your oral skills will be uploaded weeks prior to the oral test. The instructor will assess the student's mastery of related vocabulary, grammar structures and idiomatic expression in Italian.

Final Test

The final test is an <u>IN - CLASS</u> examination. A mock version of the final test will be available prior to the test itself. The final test will take place during regular class time on the last day of classes (**April 1, 2020**).

Please remember to:

- Check LEARN for slides and notes and check this syllabus regularly for test dates, assignment due dates, etc.
- come to class PREPARED to practice new structures and expressions
- attend your weekly scheduled tutorial
- Check regularly the 'Club italiano SJU' facebook page and try to watch a videoclip, listen to a song or read an article on a regular basis. Remember that exposing yourself to as much Italian as possible is key to fast-tracking language learning.
